- Making global value chains more sustainable OECD Guidelines
- Supporting companies in addressing RBC risks
- Multistakeholder projects of (Dutch/local) companies together with civil society organisations
- Improved supply chain due dilligence by companies
- -> : local/regional causes and stakeholders



Objectives Fund Against Child Labour

- Making global value chains more sustainable OECD Guidelines
- Supporting companies in addressing child labour (risks and root causes)
- Multistakeholder projects of (Dutch/local) companies together with civil society organisations

-> : local/regional causes and stakeholders



Where and who?

- Local projects in producing countries
- Companies should have direct link (influence) with the RBC-risk
- Companies can be competitors or have a buyer-supplier relationship.
- Not an investment programme
- Total budget appr. EUR 5 mln/ annum 2019 2022;
- Max EUR 475,000 subsidy per project, max 70% of project costs



Pillar 1 projects: why, where and what?

Most projects have a relation with **commodities**,

- Agri: cocoa (3), coffee (2), spices, rice, soy, palmoil (2), wood (2), banana
- Mining: gold, cobalt, coal, stone

RBC themes: living wage (10), health & safety (6), biodiversity (5), environment (4),

Countries: 17 countries evenly spread over the continents; India stands out (3)











Example 1: Spices Indonesia

- Organisations: Verstegen, Fairfood and three Indonesian companies.
- Objective: living wage, improve income of farmers with 15%
- How: generate value through capitalisation of data (block chain)
- Track & Trace helps Verstegen to have more insight in their value chain and to target their actions



Example 2: Palmoil Colombia

- Organisations: ADM, Solidaridad, Aceitas.
- Objective: improve health & safety at small scale palmoil producer
- How: Customised methodology to support farmers to work in conformity with RSPO and SA8000 requirements
